


High Holiday Services

Rabbi's Message: A Time to Plant, a Time to Mourn, a Time to Embrace

Shalom!! As I write this many of us are in the midst of summer, which often means we may be planning picnics, concerts, visits with family and friends, travels, gardening, and hopefully other wonderful things. Interestingly, Judaism teaches us that this is also really a very serious time, the beginning of the preparations for the High Holiday season, and therefore there is much soul work that is coming our way. This comes in the form of a series of rather serious events which appear on our calendar between now and the High Holidays:

On July 16 this year is the 17th of the Hebrew month of Tammuz. This is a fast day that marks when the walls of Jerusalem were breached by the Romans in 69 CE and also marks when Moses broke the tablets.

Soon after the 17th of Tammuz as we enter the severe heat of the summer, we enter into the 3week period when we prepare to mourn the destruction of the Holy Temple and our people's descent into exile. (July 16 to August 6 this year)

The 3 week-period then concludes with the fast of the 9th of Av, or Tisha B'Av, the date when both Holy Temples were set aflame. This is the saddest day of the Jewish calendar, and it is also the date that many other tragedies befell our people. (Aug 6 this year.)

Please note that our sages remind us that there is more to these commemorations than fasting and lamentation. In fact, it is believed that the messiah was born on Tisha B'Av and so metaphorically this is a special time when the remedies for the problems of the world are also born and we can be inspired to create a more just and compassionate world.

Finally, after the month of Av comes the month of Elul, the month right before the High Holidays. One translation for "Elul" Is "search" which hints to us that this is the time to really delve into soulsearching.

Here are some suggestions for our focus on forgiveness and soul work in four main areas, beginning in Elul and continuing thru the High Holidays:

1) RELATIONS WITH OTHERS: We reflect on our actions of the past year towards others. We ask ourselves: Whom did I harm, hurt, or mistreat, in any way-whether intentionally or inadvertently. In many cases we have to "clean-up" old business from several years past, not just last year. It may seem overwhelming, but it will be very rewarding to connect with the people with whom we need to talk. No one can do this for us. It can lighten our spirit immensely to clean this part of our "house."

2) RELATIONS WITH GOD: We reflect on how have we transgressed or neglected our obligations to the Holy One. This is equally important, as only God knows many of the inner adjustments we need to make. According to the Talmud, it is the work in reaching forgiveness with others which paves the way for our wholehearted personal approach to God for forgiveness.

3) RELATIONS WITH OURSELVES: We reflect on how have we transgressed or neglected our obligations to ourselves. We honor ourselves as partners with God and therefore should honor our bodies and souls, especially watching what goes in (food) and what comes out (words) of our mouths!!

4) RELATIONS WITH THE WORLD: We reflect on how we have been a citizen of this world. Have we participated in our congregation, community, city, country, world? Have we stood up for injustice to Jews? Non-Jews? Have we spoken out against anti-Semitism? Anti-Israel propaganda? Racism? Children at risk? Destruction of the environment? Homelessness and hunger? The specter of nuclear war?

So let's get to work!!!!!!! Our sages remind us that because of the intensity of the work, the time to begin is NOW (starting on the 17th of Tammuz, July 16 this year)!

This year, 2022, the High Holiday dates are: Jewish New Year, Rosh Hashanah (Sept 25 and 26 this year; the Day of Atonement, Yom Kippur (Oct. 4 and 5 this year). Our services at Mayim Shalom will be on the Shabbat between these dates, on Shabbat Shuva (or "Shabbat of the return"), implying this is a time when we return to our holier nature through forgiveness work, and that is on Sept. 30 and Oct. 1. I look forward to seeing you all soon at the annual picnic weekend Aug 12-14 and also at our High Holidays!
